ELWD FLOWER SHOW



On August 3 and 4, our District sponsored a NGC Standard Flower Show at Bellevue Botanical Garden, in the Aaron Education Center.

The East Lake Washington District Judges Council decided last February to name the show "Visions." The idea to hold it in a public space came from Show Chairman Elaine Pinkerton. The Aaron Education Center is a large space. Elaine drew up the staging plan. Staging Chairmen Jean Pass and Melissa Firuz transformed the space with exhibits of eyeglasses: large paper and seed spectacles. Thoughtful sayings done in calligraphy on lime paper, pipe cleaner iris, and more. Melissa did the invitational design and made Visions come to life.

There were 143 horticulture entries, 37 designs, 21 photography entries and 3 educational exhibits.

The show took four hours to set up and one hour to dismantle. I always think of flower shows as a little bit of magic. We take months to write the schedule, weeks to focus on entries and an hour

to dismantle....poof and it is all gone. But pictures help us hold on to the memories. Since ELWD holds only one small flower show each term, putting on a full scale show was a remarkable undertaking.

The schedule included a petite design section, a table section and a photography/Botanical Arts section. Among the new designs in the schedule (as per the 2017 Handbook for Flower Shows), were Low Profile and Grouped Mass designs.

Some top winners: Debbie Spiller created the "tall grouped mass" design, which won the Carolyn Erickson "all fresh design award." The exhibition table created by Debbie DeFilipps, titled "Sunset" won the Table Artistry award, and Mary Deviny won the Petite award. Charlene Trent-Lewis won the Photography award and Melissa Firuz won the Award of Horticultural Excellence.

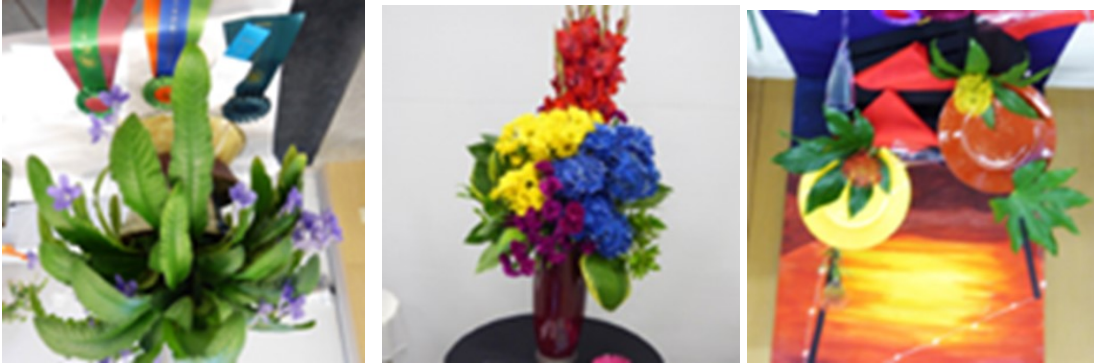
Charlene took pictures of the show for the Book of Evidence.

DAHLIA FALL/WINTER CARE

Those of us new to dahlia care, or in need of a refresher, will appreciate this information provided by the Puget Sound Dahlia Association.

After the first frost (around November 1) cut dahlias down, leaving only a short stalk. Carefully lift the tuber clump by digging as least a foot from the stalk, then slowly pull on this "handle" while using the spade as a lever. Take care to shake or sweep away any loose soil to prevent broke necks; such tubers are not viable. Wash the dirt off the clump. Trim off thread-like root hairs and any damaged tubers. Don't forget to mark or label the tubers for easy identification.

It is best to divide tuber clump in fall, Use a sharp, sturdy knife or pruners. Each tuber must have a "growth eye" (found where tubers attach to the main stalk.) You may soak the divided tubers in 5% bleach for 15 minutes, allow them to dry and then dust the tubers with sulphur or Captan to prevent fungal disease.

The roots will keep best if the storage area is cool, but always kept rom freezing. An attached garage or a crawl space works well. Check that the temperatures remain below 45 degrees F. Fungus diseases appear where storage conditions are too

warm and if there is too much moisture present. Most growers store tubers in plastic bags, half-filled with slightly damp vermiculite, peat moss or cedar chips moistened to prevent shriveling. Store bats in sturdy boxes or Styrofoam container, such as those used in shipping grapes. Line a box with plastic or newspaper and store the bags securely until March. Check the roots twice during the winter and discard any that show rot.

Dahlia tubers left in the ground will survive cold winter days if kept from freezing. After cutting off stalks, heap mulch over the roots and cover the pile with a tarp. Good drainage is essential for tubers to be kept successfully in this manner. However, the risk remains that a cool spring will cause them to rot. If you do not plan on digging tubers annually, plan on having a working party—after two or three years the tuber clumps can be quite large. So successful division of such clumps may present a huge challenge.
